
Buckets of NDIS funding

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CORE

- 1. Assistance with Daily Life
- 2. Transport
- 3. Consumables
- 4. Assistance with Social,Economic & CommunityParticipation

Rule: can be spent flexibly across all Core support categories*

*except transport sometimes

Also excludes quote required or specified supports – e.g. assistance with preperation & delivery of meals, specialised driver training

CAPITAL

- 5. Assistive Technology
- 6. Home Modifications

Rule: **not flexible at all** – can only be used to purchase specific items as approved by NDIA

CAPACITY BUILDING

- 7. Support Coordination
- 8. Improved Living Arrangements
- 9. Increased Social & Community Participation
- 10. Finding and Keeping a Job
- 11.Improved Relationships
- 12.Improved Health & Wellbeing
- 13. Improved Learning
- 14.Improved Life Choices
- 15.Improved Daily Living

Rule: flexible within the same support category but not between categories

Reasonable and Necessary

The NDIA use the Reasonable and Necessary criteria to determine what can be approved and funded in an NDIS Plan.

In using this checklist, you must be able to answer YES to ALL these questions.

Disability Related Is this a need because of your disability?	YES	NO
Goals and aspirations Does it help you to achieve the goals, objectives and aspirations in your plan?	YES	NO
Social and economic participation Does it help you to participate in things with your family, in the community and/or work?	YES	NO
Value for money Are the costs reasonable – this includes thinking about both the benefits and the cost of other supports that could be used?	YES	NO
Effective, beneficial, good practice Is it likely to provide what you need and be helpful for you considering current good practice and/or evidence?	YES	NO
Expectations of families, carers and informal networks Does it consider what would normally be expected of families, carers and informal networks and the community to provide?	YES	NO
Most appropriate funding body There are no other programs or systems (e.g. health, education, justice) that could pay for it so the NDIS is the right funding body?	YES	NO

NDIS Using Your Plan – What can you spend your funding on?

Once you have an approved NDIS Plan, consider the following things when deciding what to buy with your NDIS funding.

1. Will the support or service help you to achieve the goals in your NDIS plan?	YES	NO
2. Is the cost of the support or service reasonably priced and is it best value for money compared to other supports?	YES	NO
3. Can you afford the support or service within your approved NDIS budget?	YES	NO
Remember, your funding needs to last the entire period of your plan.	O	O
4. Will the support or service help you to improve how you connect to your local community and improve the relationships you have with family and friends? It should not replace supports that would usually be provided by family, friends and within your community.	YES	NO
5. Is the support or service something that should be funded by other government services instead? For example, dental, health or hospital services, education, housing and public transport are all provided through other government services. Remember, all communities should have facilities and activities that are inclusive and accessible to people with disability.	YES	NO
6. Will the support or service help you to participate in activities with friends and other members of your community, or help you to find or keep a job?	YES	NO
7. Is it safe? Your supports and services should not cause you any harm or put other people at risk.	YES	NO
